

Fruit Punch

If you are celebrating New Year's Eve, then this recipe from WI may be very useful. I leave to you how much alcohol or otherwise you

This recipe can be adapted depending on what fruit and drinks you have to hand! It can be used for children if made from fruit juice.

Ingredients

- 1 Dessert Pear, Peach, Apple
- 2 small Oranges or 3 Tangerines
- a few grapes
- 1 Lemon
- 1 small cucumber

Sugar

White Wine or Fruit Juice

Method

Prepare the fruit and cut into attractive small pieces or leave whole if small.

Slice the cucumber finely.

Put all into a bowl, add sugar to taste and sprinkle with lemon juice. Cover with inexpensive white wine or fruit juice.

Leave for 6 hours in a cool place before serving. To serve ladle into wine glasses and top with soda if liked.

Tips

Keep the fruit submerged with a plate to prevent browning. Alternative liquids that could be used are lemonade or cold, weak tea.

Food Safety

In busy times when we are trying to make the most of our money and not waste food, the WI have offered the following tips- Did you know all this?

When eggs float, are they bad?

Don't use the egg float test to determine safety. Eggs are safe to eat for a couple of days after the best before date if they are cooked thoroughly.





Is food safe if the can has a dent in it?

If the dent on the can is shallow and there are no other obvious signs that the can is damaged (such as the can expanding or leaking) your food should remain fit to eat.

How long can you safely eat rice for after cooking? Keep rice in the fridge for no more than one day. When you re heat rice always check the dish is steaming hot all the way through.





Can you eat potatoes when they start to sprout?
Remove any sprouts on potatoes before using them and remember to cut off any green or rotten bits.

Can you eat brown bananas?

Fruit or vegetables that are a bit overripe, such as wrinkly carrots, brown bananas, and slightly mushy strawberries, can be eaten normally (providing they are not mouldy). Alternatively, they can be used in cooking, baking or smoothies.
